## Program Eligibility

Incoming Double Degree students must meet the following criteria:

- Incoming Double Degree students must be regularly enrolled, for the duration of the program, in a Master's degree as per our partnership agreement with your home institution.

## The Application Process

- You must submit your official transcripts and resume via the application link provided after you have been nominated by your home university.
- **Video Essay:** You will be asked three randomized questions which are designed to be answered without any advance preparation. There will also be a question that requires a 150-word response which you will have 5 minutes to complete.

**Please note, you will only have two weeks to complete this item.**

- Once you have completed the online application, you will receive further information and guidance from our office.

## Health Insurance

### Mandatory: University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP)

UHIP medical insurance offers coverage for basic services like emergency hospital visits and physical examinations. UHIP does not cover supplementary medical services, such as dental work or physiotherapy. International students must have primary health insurance provided by UHIP for the duration of their time in Canada. Fees are subject to change from year to year.

Students who hold a Canadian citizenship and are studying from another country may still be eligible for UHIP depending on period of stay. Email [SmithGradExchange@queensu.ca](mailto:SmithGradExchange@queensu.ca) for more information.

### Optional: Supplementary Medical Insurance

Supplementary insurance is available and covers some services such as a portion of the cost of prescription medicine, physiotherapy, chiropractic care, eye examinations, dental work, vision care, travel coverage, and other services. Supplementary health plans are administered by our student government office, [Society of Graduate and Professional Students \(SGPS\)](#). We strongly recommend exchange students purchase supplementary insurance coverage for Canada through the Queen's Student Government Offices or the provider of their choice in their home country or in Canada.

You should not book any travel or accommodations until you have received your acceptance letter and Certificate of Admission.
